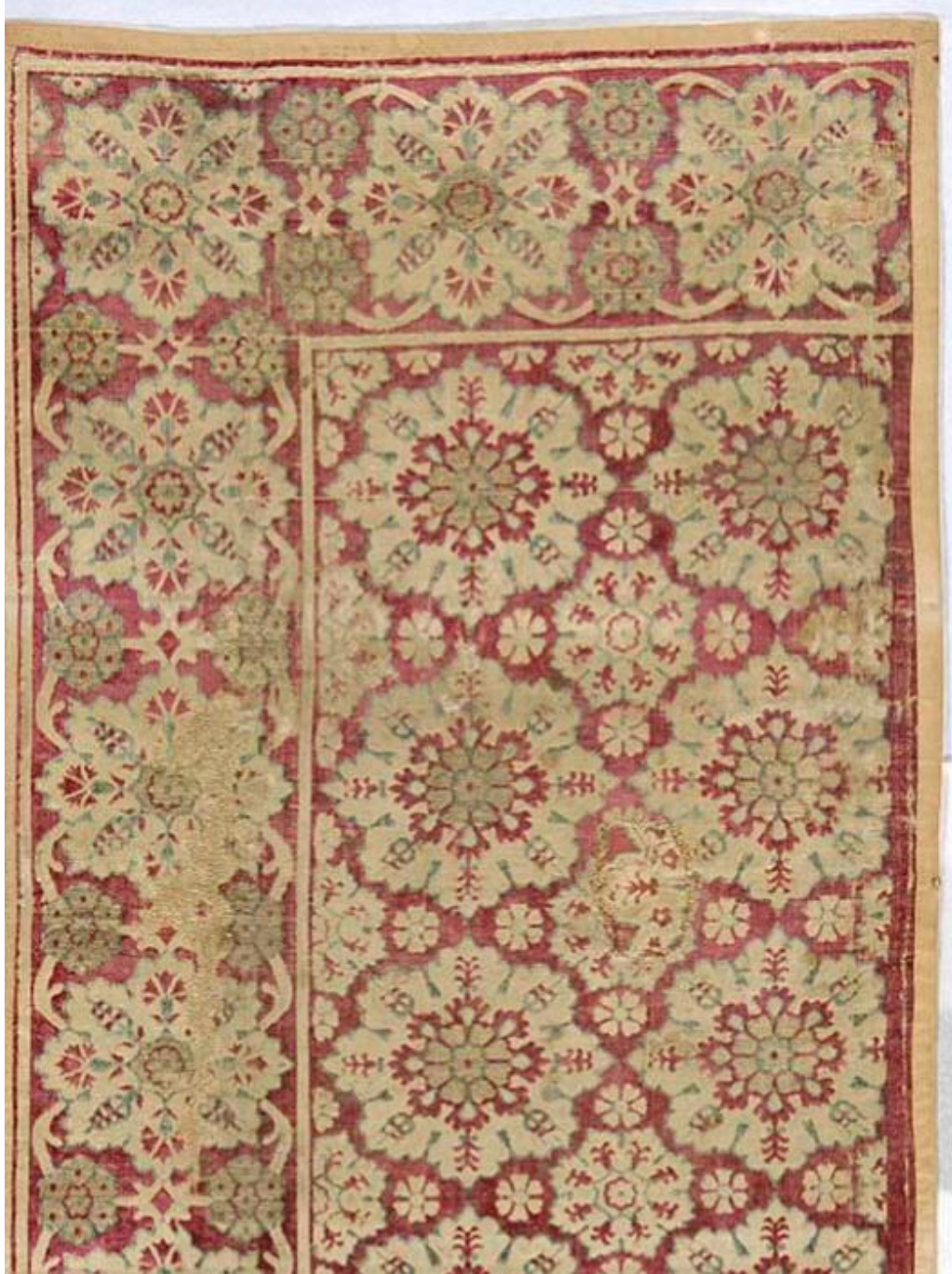


# Basic Detail Report



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## **Title Voided Silk Brocade Çatma Panel with Floral Motifs**

Date 17th century

Medium Silk velvet

Description This silk textile, or çatma, was woven in the first half of the 1700s in Bursa in present-day Turkey during the rule of the Ottoman empire. Its bold pattern is composed of rows of eight-lobed medallions containing rosebuds and delicate hyacinth stems. Its border is lined with medallions decorated with rosebuds and carnations. The çatma was probably created as a maq'ad, or "sitting cloth," intended to cover the sedir, the main furnishing of an Ottoman household that was used as a seating area during the day and as a sleeping quarters at night.
